# **ABOUT SIGHTS FOR HOPE**

Sights for Hope transforms the lives of people with visual impairments and blindness by removing barriers to independence and well-being. Our services provide the skills, supports, and solutions that advance their self-sufficiency and quality of life. We carry forward a tradition inspired by Helen Keller nearly a century ago throughout Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley and Monroe County, and most of our services are provided at no cost. Founded in 1928, Sights for Hope is a member of the Pennsylvania Association for the Blind (PAB) and the VisionServe Alliance.



### **OUR MISSION STATEMENT**

To provide people with visual impairments the **skills, supports, and solutions** that advance their self-sufficiency.

### **OUR VISION STATEMENT**


To **transform the lives** of people with visual impairments by removing the barriers to their independence and success.

### **OUR THREE PILLARS**

**Skills:** We teach adaptive skills to accomplish daily life activities.

**Supports:** We provide supports that counter the effects of visual impairments and blindness and we increase access to medical care, healthy food, and other essential needs.

**Solutions:** We advance solutions that enhance sight capabilities.







### **OUR SERVICES**

Life Skills Education: Group and one-on-one sessions that teach vision rehabilitation, orientation and mobility, adaptive use of technology, and elemental life skills.

**Youth and Family Programs:** Life Skills Education programs that help young people with visual impairments build the skills to become independent adults and show their families how to empower them.

Technology Solutions: Functional low vision exams by a professional optometrist

and individualized consultations performed to match clients and patients with the assistive devices that best meet their needs.

**Prevention Services:** Free vision screenings for children ages 6 and under to identify sight conditions; partnerships that provide eye exams and glasses to advance school readiness; and community education programs that promote eye health, eye safety, and inclusion of people with visual impairments.

### **OUR CONSTITUENTS**

Our population of clients with visual impairments increased by **14%** in our 2021-2022 service year.

A total of **42%** of our clients live below or near the federal poverty line, and a total of 85% of them live at or below 300% of the poverty line.

A total of **82%** of our clients are ages 55 and older, and 64% of our clients are ages 65 and older.

We perform vision screenings on **5,000** or more children ages 0-6 annually, and up to **15%** of them have an impairment of some kind.

More than **90%** of our children's screening events in a typical year are held at preschools, at daycare centers, and during kindergarten registration and orientation events.



Approximately **70%** of our clients are diagnosed with Macular Degeneration, Glaucoma, Diabetic Reinopathy, Cataracts, or Retinits Pigmentosa.



# YOUR IMPACT: SKILLS



### LIFE SKILLS EDUCATION

Our Life Skills Education programs are provided in group and one-on-one sessions and empower people with visual impairments to increase their self-sufficiency.

143 Clients participated in Life Skills Education programs

### REHABILITATIVE SKILLS

Clients learn how to use their existing vision most effectively and how to apply specific functional techniques.

### ORIENTATION AND MOBILITY (O&M) SKILLS

Clients learn how to understand their surroundings and how to navigate between familiar locations.





### TECHNOLOGY SKILLS

Clients explore presentday and emerging technologies that improve their quality of life. Sessions also help clients gain a deeper understanding of the use of the devices they use.

### ELEMENTAL SKILLS

Clients learn critical nonphysical skills of daily life. Examples of topics include financial planning, fraud protection, voting, meditation, and mindfulness.

### YOUTH AND FAMILY SERVICES

Children learn new skills and have memorable experiences in our summer camp program. We also are developing a Mom and Me in Motion program for children ages 2 and under and their families; a Preschool Playtime program for kids ages 3-7 and their families; and a Youth Transition program for teens.



# **YOUR IMPACT: SUPPORTS**



Our support services apply an individualized approach to help clients advance their emotional wellness and increase their access to critical needs.

### CASEWORKER SERVICES

Our caseworkers guide clients to services that meet their personal goals, monitor client progress, arrange for one-on-one instruction, and make referrals. Caseworkers also conduct home visits, during which they can help a client read mail, write checks, manage finances, complete forms, and perform basic home repairs to ensure a client's safety.

### GUIDED TRANSPORT SERVICE

Our guided transport service increases our clients' access medical care, food supplies, our services, and other essentials. With "door-through-door" service, our drivers also guide clients to and from the vehicle and provide additional assistance – such as reading paperwork and carrying bag

### PEER SUPPORT GROUPS AND COUNSELING

Peer Support Groups give clients opportunities to express needs and concerns, participate in problem solving, and share resources in environments of openness, respect, encouragement, and trust. Individual sessions with professional counselors help clients become more accepting of their impairments, deal with other emotional challenges, and improve their outlook on life.

### SOCIAL AND RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Our social and recreational activities help clients remain active, execute skills and techniques that they have learned, connect with those who face similar challenges, and avoid the harmful effects of isolation.

### **PUBLIC SERVICE OPPORTUNITIES**

We formed the Lehigh Valley Sights for Hope Lions Club and the Monroe Sights for Hope Lions Club in 2022 to empower our clients to give back to their communities. The clubs select and implement community service projects at their own direction.

The Lehigh Valley club was formed as a branch of the Whitehall Lions Club and was sponsored by the Whitehall Lions in 2021-2022. The Monroe club was formed as a branch of the Stroudsburg Lions Club and was sponsored by the Whitehall Lions in 2021-2022. Lions International is the world's largest service club organization, with 1.4 million members in 200 countries.







Sights for Hope traces its inception to efforts by Lions clubs in 1928. Lions clubs and districts in the Lehigh Valley and Monroe County provide financial support to our organization annually.

# **YOUR IMPACT: SOLUTIONS**



We advance solutions that enhance sight capabilities. These include our Low Vision Care services and free vision screenings for pre-kindergarten children, which help them be ready to succeed in school.

### CHILDREN'S VISION SCREENINGS

Our vision screenings for pre-kindergarten children – ages 0-6 – are conducted with hand-held Spot Vision Screeners that accurately detect conditions such as nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatisms, strabismus, and amblyopia. We also work with partners to help families receive eye exams and glasses for their children when there is a need.

### FUNCTIONAL LOW VISION EXAMS

Functional exams at our Lehigh Valley and Monroe low vision care centers are available to both our clients and patients referred by external physicians. These specialized exams determine what magnifiers or devices are best for each person.

### ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGIES

Consultations about assistive technologies are provided with all examinations. Clients and patients also can purchase devices for everyday life tasks inside our stores. We also help clients and patients seek financial assistance toward their purchases.

### YOUR GIFTS OF HOPE HELP US GIVE INDEPENDENCE TO PEOPLE LIKE DANIEL, WHO LIVES WITH IMPAIRED VISION.

Daniel was placed in foster care at the age of 4. Abused, neglected, and malnourished, Daniel suffered trauma that caused him to begin losing his vision at age 9. He eventually became completely blind, was aging out of foster care, had no family, and was very scared.

When Daniel was embraced by Sights for Hope, his life changed. He began to attend social gatherings and meet peers who also struggle with visual impairments. It was there that he met John, a client who had lost his wife. John asked Daniel to move in with him. John loved and mentored Daniel for 4 years. Daniel learned how to use a tablet computer, cut his own hair, shave, and even play the saxophone and guitar.

John suddenly passed away and Daniel found himself facing homelessness. Using the internet and his tablet, Daniel found a place to live in Bangor, PA. This would be the first time he would be living completely on his own, and he was scared.

Sights for Hope's guided transport service brought Daniel to programs were he learned how to live by himself. Our Vision Rehabilitation Therapist went to Daniel's home and taught him how to cook, do laundry, maneuver around his apartment, cross the street, and take out his own trash. Daniel currently pays his own rent is becoming more independent each day.

"The best thing about Sights for Hope is they are always there to help no matter what the situation is," Daniel says. "They help me understand me. What makes me who I am – that I was abandoned - going through, tough times with the family. It's very important."



# **OUR BIG IMPACT GOALS**

Sights for Hope is dedicated to affecting the greatest possible impact for people in Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley and Monroe County who live with visual impairments and blindness. We have set four big impact goals to achieve from 2022 to 2030.

### **GOAL: Assistive Tech**

To provide assistive technologies to 2,500 people with visual impairments and blindness. These devices boost their ability to interact with the people and environments around them.



### **GOAL: Transports for Access**

To provide 25,000 guided transports to people with visual impairments. These transports increase access to medical care, food, life skills education, and critical wellness services.





Sights for Hope conducted an analysis in 2022 using industry information and special data from the U.S. Census Bureau. The analysis found that **there are approximately 17,164 people** in Sights for Hope's service area that have difficulty seeing with corrective lenses or blindness. ### **GOAL: Life Skills**

To provide life skills education to 2,500 people with visual impairments. These educational opportunities enhance their ability to live independently.



### **GOAL: Solutions for Learning**

To ensure that 2,500 children ages 0-6 receive professional eye exams and glasses or equivalent solutions. These solutions advance their readiness to learn.





### **BECAUSE OF YOUR SUPPORT,** 10-YEAR-OLD CAROLINE IS CONFIDENT THAT NOTHING CAN STAND IN THE WAY OF ACCOMPLISHING HER DREAMS AND GOALS.

In May 2021, Jenni noticed that her daughter, Caroline, was struggling to see her computer screen during virtual school sessions. Every day, Caroline would sit closer and closer to the screen.

After months of doctor appointments, Caroline received a diagnosis of Stargardt's disease, an inherited form of juvenile progressive macular degeneration from which she will lose her central vision over time. There is no cure or way for her vision to be corrected.

Overwhelmed with grief for her child's vision loss, Jenni cried and broke down many times. Caroline was only 8 years old.

Their new normal had just begun when they found Sights for Hope. Caroline had a low vision exam and got new sunglasses to help preserve her vision. More importantly, she began attending events with other kids who live with visual impairments, finally meeting other children her age who are just like her.

Of her experiences with Sights for Hope, Caroline says, "I love going to Camp I CAN! My favorite parts were going to Knoebels and going on rides, and crafting beaded bracelets with Miss Kim. She is super nice! I liked riding in the vans with the friendly drivers. The best part is that I made new friends who are also blind or have low vision, just like me."

Today, Caroline is a bright, inquisitive 10-year-old who is confident that nothing can stand in the way of accomplishing her dreams and goals.


